White Plains hosts Earth Week

Monday will begin plethora of events about the environment

white Plains — On Monday at the steps of City Hall, White Plains will usher in its first Earth Week with a dedication of three native tree species that will be planted along Main Street

planted along Main Street.

Dozens of events, from trail cleanups to art production with recycled materials to tips for budding locavores, will follow throughout the week across the city.

The events will culminate April 30 along Mamaroneck Avenue, with the "Sustain White Plains Celebration," which will include music, 45 green exhibits, new en-

vironmental awards and children's activities.

Widely expanding on past Earth Day celebrations, the city's year-old Sustainability and Environmental Enhancement Committee and the White Plains Business Improvement District partnered with local organizations, businesses and city departments to create the weeklong event.

"A day is a quick shot," said councilman Dennis Power, the SEEC chairman and a co-chairman of Earth Week.

He said much more can be highlighted over a week and he hopes the additional time and events will increase participation.

"We wanted to make sure it was accessible for everyone that wanted to come," said events cochairwoman Bonnie Hagen,
